We support Conformation shows, hold Specialties, Boosters and Sanction Matches. The Club offer perpetual trophies, which are awarded at our annual Specialty Show. If the winner lives outside of Canada, the trophies are retained by the Club. Ina ll instances keeper trophies are given to the winners. We also have specially purchased gifts awarded at our Booster shows. At Sanction Matches we offer simple gifts as well.

The Club operates an information breed booth at various shows and events with the purpose of educating and promoting the breed. Club members volunteer their own and their dogs' time at these booths.

Many members have their Rhodesian Ridgebacks in agility and obedience training. Some members have Ridgebacks that are also very active in Therapy Dog programmes. Racing (lure coursing, straight racing and Uval racing) is quickly becoming a new and popular activity for the pet owner.

A newsletter, The Ridgeback Roster, is published for members. It offers interesting articles, show results, advertisements by members, club activities and dates of special events.

There are Directors or Coordinators in every State and Canadian province. The overall individual who holds the RRR authority in Canada is Carole Bradley-Kennedy.

Within RRCEC we answer the call for help for ridgebacks in distress or in need of re-homing. The first action taken is to ascertain if possible, who the breeder is. All details about the dog and it's immediate situation are provided and discussed with Carole and appropriate action is agreed upon. All follow up action is the responsibility of the appropriate Regional Rescue Coordinator.


I finally purchased my first Ridgeback in 2000, from Gordon Petrie of Bardonridge kennel. Owen was a lovely dog and everything a Ridgeback should be. He was my first show dog, my first obedience dog, and humoured me through many other activities, like agility (not his thing but he followed along at a trot and made it through our classes). My foundation bitch, Safi, was purchased from Tumomak kennels in Massachusetts from Sue Rexford. I had fallen in love with Sheikh, a male imported from Finland and waited for what seemed like forever, for one of his female pups. She was Ch. Tumomak Nirokii Safi Kianga CDX RN CGN. She had Nirokii's first litter in 2008, and the rest, is history as they say. I currently share my home with 5 ridgebacks, and at the moment, participate in conformation, lure coursing, and tracking.



#### DIANA PETHICK - SECRETARY & JIM BECKETT - TREASURER





We both grew up in England with dogs as part of our families. In Diana's case there were always the house / farm dogs but also with Labradors and field spaniels as Gun dogs and for Jim, a variety of breeds and then lurchers (welsh sheep dogs crossed with whippets) the traditional poachers dogs. We grew up close geographically but did not meet until we were in Canada when we met we rented a house in the Gatineau Hills north of Ottawa and planned to acquire a dog. As it happened our landlord was looking for somebody to look after her dog as she was planning some extensive travels. She asked whether we would look after Rosie which is how we met a ridgeback for the first time and the rest they say is history.

That started us on a 45 year association with breed. Within a year we added our second ridgeback and have usually had at least two and as many as five ridgebacks ever since. We moved to Mountain in 1989 and after we retired we started breeding under the name of Mountainridge Kennel.

While the ridgebacks have been a central part of our life we have been very active in a variety of areas, not only the large flower and vegetable garden around our I860s farm house ( which in itself requires a lot of attention ) but also in the community including therapy dog work.

With respect to the ridgebacks we been very active in RRCEC, Diana joining the Board as a Director and becoming President for a number of years and Jim, also joining the Board as Treasurer. Whilstour dogs have featured In Conformation, Rally Obedience and agility. We have tried hard to promote activities for the pet owners who after all are the vast majority of RR families in the Club, through walks, picnics, racing/ lure coursing and educational sessions (scenting and agility). On a wider front we have participated in the last eight World Congresses which are held every four years in different countries and have been active participants in many of the discussions about the breed in that forum. In fact attending these Congresses has been very rewarding in itself in providing the opportunity to meet so many enthusiasts from around the world and to see ridgebacks from different countries at each of the World Congress Championship shows.



#### GEORGE WHITNEY - ONTARIO NORTH


I am a graduate of Utah State University and a Professional Wildlife Biologist. I worked for 26 years with the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources as a biologist and resources manager and in 1990 moved to Zimbabwe to direct an environmental and natural resources management program on behalf of CIDA, for the Government of Zimbabwe.

While in Zimbabwe, I acquired my foundation dogs and successfully campaigned a number of my dogs to Zimbabwean champion status during a 15 year period. I have been a Director of the Zimbabwe Kennel Club and I served with the Rhodesian Ridgeback Club of Zimbabwe (the Parent Club), most recently as President.

After retiring from the government, I remained in Zimbabwe and managed a large wildlife concession and a game ranch where my dogs lived in the bush with me and hunted as they were designed to do. I am one of the few recent ridgeback breeders to have tested his dogs in the art of lion baying.

I returned to Canada in 2008 with my kennel of ridgebacks. I currently live on a small farm in eastern Ontario, where I continue to breed dogs of African lineage and campaign them in the show ring.

I try not to play favourites, but of the two dozen or so dogs I have owned two bitches stand out. Both were dark wheaten, one in Zimbabwe and the other I currently own. Both were/are very independently minded, tough and self-contained. In the African bush, both would excel. Etosha, my Zim girl could deal with all things African. My current Shasha is the better mother though.





#### LISA CONLEY - ONTARIO EAST

My name is Lisa Conley and I am the breeder that started FoxTrot Ridgebacks. I originally was involved with terriers and after losing our white shepherd we wanted a large breed for the country which would fit in well with the terriers. We educated ourselves, asked questions and read quite a bit and fell in love with the Rhodesian Ridgeback. Our first ridgeback was amazing, her name was Morgan, purchased from Kopera and she never put a foot wrong. That was just less that 20 years ago. I was involved in showing & doing lure coursing with my terriers previously and wanted to continue with my ridgeback. One thing I have learned about Ridgebacks is whatever you are going through they seem to know and sense it and they seem to be at sometimes your best support system.



# BRAGS & WAGS



## What does it take Crufts my non-bucket list dream!

My journey started 6 years ago when I contacted Valerie Michaud, Cataraqui for my first RR and the adventure began. My requirements were simple - health, temperament and brains. Showing was not important. As they say the rest is history! Never in my wildest dreams was Crufts even on my radar! It's only one the world's oldest, largest and most prestigious competition for the canine fancy!

What did it take for a Canadian dog to qualify for Crufts 2019?

The top five dogs from each breed according to the Top Show Dog point system, as well as the Best of Breed, Best of Opposite, Select Dog, Select Bitch and Award of Merit Winners at the National Specialties agreed by the Canadian Kennel Club qualify. Additionally All Group Placement Winners (1st, 2nd, 3rd & 4th in each group) at pre determined show are eligible. The Renaissance Dog Association held on Saturday April 14 2018 was the qualifying show for this year's competition The qualifications for Crufts 2020 have yet to be advertised for Canada.

Last summer was Xenia's second time competing at Nationals. Her first time she went Select Bitch. I knew that she had qualified for Crufts then but I never entertained the idea of entering. But this year something was different. Having such a large contingent in the ring meant that I could actually have time to watch Xenia do her thing while she was lead around the ring by my coach/mentor and friend, Noreena Seery. All along all I could think was she really has a chance at this! Our judge kept an eye on her the entire time. I had never been more proud of her! That's when Judge Rui Oliveira chose Xenia as Best of Opposite. I was so proud of the team. I was starting to come down from all the excitement when Noreena dropped the news! "You do know what Xenia just did?" I looked quizzically at her. "You've qualified for Crufts!" I had never been at such at a loss for words! Wow Crufts! For some reason this really felt real! That was it! During my time with Judge Oliveira when taking our multiple win pictures, I thanked him again for the win and that it qualified her for Crufts. I then learnt that he had recently had a Crufts assignment and that he felt that she would be very competitive. He became a cheer leader and hoped that she would go!

A few weeks later, I finally came down to reality and started researching the ins and outs of Crufts. Not once did I even think that I wasn't going! So much to do! The most prevalent comment was to book your hotel early as rooms fill; very quickly! So on I went to book my room!

#### Timeline of this to do:

- September: book room (made sure no change cancellation)
- Early October: Applied for her ATC ( Authority to Compete) # with Kennel Club
- October: Contact CFIA for all relevant information regarding travelling with a dog to the UK and return and make appointment for Federal Vet sign off
- October: Contact Animal Reception Centre (ARC) (UK) for requirements -wow overwhelming!
- November: received Xenia's ACT # this is really coming together!
- November: research flight options and weigh them out. Booked Ottawa Heathrow direct (seamed like the smart choice at the time) Lesson don't book on the weekend when staff are not capable of completely answering question re travelling with a pet. Called air Canada Cargo for more info and book Xenia's spot on the flight! NO can do. Cargo (pets ) are only booked 28 max before departure date!
- December: booked van
- December complete ARC paperwork and send
- January: send in my entry
- February: reserve Xenia's spot on the plane
- February: Schedule vet appointment Fit to Fly certification and Tapeworm treatment
- February: Find UK vet and schedule appointment for Fight to Fly certification for return trip
- February 20: entries confirmation arrives
- March 2: appointment with Vet, have completed CFIA paperwork signed
- March 3: Show prep- bath and pedicure, pack tack bag
- March 4: D-Day- 8:30 am appt CFIA vet appointment for their sign off; minor errors need to redo and have my vet resign paper work; call clinic give Rob, my vet, heads up that I need him to resign. He held up his surgery for me! Paperwork refilled and signed. Back to CFIA for 2:30 appointment. Got the official seal; Xenia is now ready to go!. Now I can relax! Signed Xenia in with AC Cargo. Paid the fees. Now off to check ourselves in.
- March 5th: Arrived at Heathrow 3 hours behind schedule due to incident at Pearson that delayed the arrival of our plane in Ottawa. Picked up van. Get call from ARC asking if my dog was in season as there was evidence of blood on her bedding! No not in season! "Oh maybe she cut her gums chewing on her crate!" Can you say panic time! And I was not allowed to see her before she was checked over by their vet! Arrived early at ARC with hopes to be able to get more information about her "injury". During our wait, I was informed that I had not completed her VAT form (taxes) before arrival! Now I have to pay taxes! So much for understanding that dogs coming to show weren't taxed. The taxes are now reimbursed once the dog has landed in country of origin. 17hrs later we are all back together! And the injury, from what I could decipher was a minimal poopy spray!

The Kennel Club shows are run slightly differently that CKC. Just like us, the sexes are divided by age but also be divided by prizes/ placements/points earned at All Breed or Breed Specific shows. Open class is our Specials but includes dogs titled champion from any Kennel Club. Ring procedure is so different. If I hadn't taken time to talk to many and watch several class I would've been so lost! One very large carpeted surface was made into two ring with chairs for the spectators which entry point at all four corners and centre of opposite sides. No fencing anywhere. When your class was ushered in, you entered from any of these and set up in no specific order! Ring steward then went in with the judge to mark attendance. Our judge opted to do the exam first send us around 1/2 the ring before looking over the next entry. While watching the boys, several of us agreed that she based lots of her judgement on how well your dog could hold a stack and her exam. Movement didn't seem to be as important to her. Judge made her selection 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th, Reserve and VHC (similar to Award of Merit) in each class including Open class. Then from there Top dog, Veteran dog and Good Citizen Scheme dog were chosen.

Then just as in CKC, the girls are next. Regular classes are done. It's our turn! Open Bitches had an entry of 26. In order to simplify judging, we were placed in numerical order. The judge kept the first four and asked for the reminder to exit the ring and to pay attention. Just as she had done in the morning with the males, her routine was exam then go around but this time we would exit so that the next in line could enter therefore always having 4 girls in the ring at a time. Once the last one had gone around, we all returned back in order. The judge quickly selected 4 from the later group of the females that she had seen and had two more to select. She struggled between Xenia and two others alias it was not to be but oh so close.

What an honour it was to represent Canada on such a huge stage. Someone mentioned that Xenia may be the first Canadian Bred competing in Crufts history. I have to say that I have made so many new friends in the breed, fanciers, breeders and judges. Some of which search me out! I love this RR family of ours.

# Vet's Corner - Lyme Disease Update

Well spring has arrived and with it tick season. Did you know that in Quebec the number of reported cases of Lyme disease in people quadrupled between 2011 and 2016 and in southeast Ontario the chance of contracting Lyme disease from tick bites is 60%. Lyme disease is transmitted by the black-legged or deer tick (*Ixodes* species) and tick season generally runs through spring, summer and fall. Due to warmer climates ticks are becoming more prevalent and the tick season is getting longer in many areas in eastern Canada.

As dog owners we often walk our dogs in areas where ticks are prevalent and should take precautions to protect both our dogs and ourselves from tick bites. Ticks can't jump or fly so they wait on grass, bushes or shrubs for an animal or human to pass by and then they crawl onto the person/animal. Common precautions for reducing the chance of being bitten by a tick include:


- avoid wooded and brushy areas that contain high grass and leaf litter;
- if you go into wooded areas, walk in the center of cleared paths;
- wear light colored long-sleeved shirts and long pants to spot ticks more easily. Tuck your shirt into your pants and pull your socks over your pant legs;
- use an insect repellent such as DEET or Icaridin;
- check yourself, your family and pets after being in an area where ticks may be present; and
- shower or bathe within two hours of returning from outdoor activities to wash away loose ticks.

The following prevention methods are also recommended for dogs:

- dogs should be treated regularly with a readily available, effective, tick-control product. Your veterinarian can recommend the best product for your pet.
- in areas where Lyme disease is common, ask your veterinarian about whether vaccination is recommended.
- dogs should be routinely checked for ticks after they have been outside, especially if they have been in tall grass and brush during the spring, summer, or fall.
- remove any ticks by using fine-pointed tweezers to grasp the head of the tick (right where it enters the skin). Pull the tick straight off, making sure not to grasp or squeeze its body.
- dogs should be brushed regularly. Watch carefully for any ticks that are removed and capture and dispose of them before they can either reattach to the dog or migrate to other pets or people in the household.


