

### **VERSATILITY**

We would like to take the opportunity to introduce you all to the updated version of our Club's Versatility program. The program has been recently updated to include many of the new sports and activities open to Ridgebacks. We hope that you'll all spend some time looking into all the things we can do with our hounds, get busy achieving new titles, and have so much fun along the way... Jesse and I are both enjoying participating in many different dog events, and although Covid has certainly limited trials this year, we've spent most of our time training new things. We hope that when 2021 rolls around, and with some luck, life gets back to some semblance of normal-we will be ready to earn a whole bunch of new titles! Below you will find some information on just a few of the many activities that are included in our Versatility program. Also take the time to look at the requirements for the Versatility title and I encourage all of you to think of which activities you'd like to try in the coming year!

**Agility**: A sport where the dog is trained to complete obstacles in a set pattern with its handler. There are multiple types of classes in agility, all with several levels of difficulty. The CKC (Canadian Kennel Club) holds agility trials, as well as AAC (Agility Association of Canada). There are many dog training schools that have agility classes, and it is a great opportunity to learn how to work as a team with your dog, as well as get in a good work out!



Obedience: There are 3 main titles in Obedience: CD (Companion Dog), CDX (Companion Dog Excellent), and UD (Utility Dog). To obtain each title, you must have 3 passing scores of at least 170/200, and earn at least half of the available points for each exercise executed. Obedience includes teaching the dog to heel (both on and off leash) in a pattern that the judge will call out to you, do a formal recall, stand for an exam by the judge, sit and down stays, retrieving a dumb bell, and many more elements-All without treats in your pocket! It's beautiful to see a well trained dog working with its handler, and while this sport definitely requires lots of practice, patience and dedication, it is a great feeling of accomplishment to walk out of an obedience ring, knowing you & your dog have put in a good routine.

Barn Hunt: In this sport, rats (safely caged) are hidden in a 'barn' setup and the dog must find the hidden rat and indicate the find to the handler. It's a timed event and there are several levels of difficulty. Classes are given at several training centers (Guides Canins in St-Lazare, QC is one of them) Rally-O: This is an 'obedience' activity but is set up very differently from traditional obedience. A rally-O ring is set up with a certain amount of numbered signs (which tell you what to ask your dog to do at each station). The judge is in the ring to score the performance, but you proceed through the stations on your own, with your dog.







In Rally-O, you may verbally encourage your dog throughout the routine, and team work and fun is very much the name of the game.

Scent Detection: There are a number of different Scent Detection organizations in Canada, including CKC & SDDA (Scent Detection Dog Association). The game here, is to teach your dog to find designated odours and 'indicate' his/her find to you (the handler). All organizations use common essential oils. For instance, SDDA uses Wintergreen, Pine & Thyme. In both organizations, you must pass an indoor search, outdoor search, and box search, to earn a title at each level. You don't have to pass all 3 searches in the same trial, but some organizations have special titles for dogs that do pass all 3 searches in the same trial. Jesse LOVES scent detection and it's an activity that you can practice inside at home on a rainy day, to occupy your dog's mind, and find new and challenging ways to get your dog to

put its nose to good use! There are great resources online for training scent detection at home (look up the scent work classes at:

Lure Coursing: Canadians with Ridgebacks have had to travel to the USA for decades if they wanted to go Lure Coursing and obtain titles with their dogs.... but not anymore! Since 2019, Ridgebacks are now part of the CKC Lure Coursing family. There is now also ASFA (American Sighthound Field Association) trials in Canada. The point system for obtaining titles and becoming a Field Trial Champion are different for these two organizations, but the dogs get to chase plastic 'bunnies' (white plastic bags) just the same at both types of trials. No training required for this sport-Ridgebacks either want to run, or, they look at you as if you've lost your mind! Some young dogs do need to build up the confidence to run the entire course, so if your dog seems enthusiastic but doesn't follow the lure all the way around, definitely don't give up. There are other 'lure coursing' events such as the Sprinter events which are much shorter and a straight line which can definitely build up a dog's confidence and enthusiasm!







I am hoping, and so looking forward to seeing many of you out with your Ridgies & participating in new activities in 2021!



# Ridgeback Tales

### Jessica, my Rhodesian Ridgeback Dog Disappears

Late this afternoon I went down to Kariba Kushinga Lodge, my new safari lodge being established on the slopes of Camp Hill in Kariba. I went down to check on the day's work, and to show workers where to put posts for the new electric fence being put up to keep elephants, buffalo, hippo, leopard and other potentially dangerous game out, and the bushbuck, duiker, waterbuck and zebra in. I took along my two Rhodesian Ridgebacks, and also those of my son and daughter. There were four Ridgebacks in all.

My bitch, Jessica is 20 months old, and is big for a bitch. It was she who in the 75<sup>th</sup> Rhodesian Ridgeback Club Anniversary show held in Harare in 1996 won First Prize in the "Best Head Challenge", "Novice Bitch", "Novice dogs & bitches" and received a Third Prize for the "Members Challenge".

While down in the wild and overgrown gully between Kushinga and Lake View Inn, Jessica soon disappeared with the other dogs. When called in after 10 minutes, only three returned and came out of the gully with me, and I thought Jessie would soon follow. She always tends to go that bit farther. I continued checking work progress, calling for Jessie periodically, but she didn't respond. Then I noticed that my son's bitch, Tonga had also left on her own. However, she often returned home when she got bored. I was a little concerned for Jessie though, as I had concentrated on training her to come immediately to my call, and she had responded so well over the past month. I went back into the gully, following the streambed looking for signs of Jessie. The two younger dogs, Induna and Tamba were with me. However, I found no sign of her. As it was getting late, I came back up along the lakeshore, hot and sweaty in a temperature of 33 ° C. As I was heading for the office I heard one single dog yelp, but was not certain of the direction. I called to see if I could hear her again, but no such luck.

I decided to check at home first, and possibly return to the gully after dark if she wasn't there. In the dark I would have the advantage of spotting Jessie (or a leopard or some other wild animal) from a long way by the reflection of her eyes in the light of a torch (flashlight). Back home I found my son's dog Tonga, but no Jessie. After feeding the younger pups and Tonga and after supper with my wife Valerie, I returned to the lakeshore in front of Kushinga, armed with a handgun, torches, a knife, wire cutter, water and more. I also took Induna (the male pup) for experience, and hoped he would indicate if he sensed or heard Jessie. He wasn't too sure about this, as he had just had a good feed, and his kennel seemed so much more comfortable. By now I was absolutely sure that I had heard Jessie yelp earlier, and that my hunch that Jessie was caught in a snare was right. My worry was that in the dark of night I would meet up with buffalo, elephant or leopard in the gully, as all of these had been in the area lately. There was also the threat of a leopard having found Jessie in the thick bush first, and she would be no match for a leopard while held by a snare.

I walked Induna on a short leash. Gingerly picking my way in the dark, stopping to shine about periodically and listen for animal sounds. We went into the gully. On approaching a particularly dense patch of undergrowth I heard a deep rumbling sound. Could it be a leopard, or a buffalo? Checking the undergrowth very carefully with my torch from different angles but spotting nothing, I was relieved when a closer rumbling turned out to be that of distant thunder. Half an hour later I reached the end of the gully, and nothing had turned up. I returned down the gully, but along the slope higher up along the Lake View Inn side. On reaching the hotel staff accommodation site, a hotel worker told me he had recently heard what sounded like a dog's yelp higher up the slope, but he wasn't certain. This reinforced my suspicion about the snare. The worker, Clever by name, and his son offered to show me where the sound had been heard, and on we went, higher up the slope, again on hands and knees in thick bush. The pup, Induna, had been on the leash all along, and had been fine. However, he had had enough of this game now, and became very suspicious of the helpers with me, keeping a very sharp eye on them as we all progressed in the dark.

After crawling through, over and under bushes for some time, checking with my torch periodically, mainly for leopard in trees! I finally caught a brief glimmer of the reflection of a set of 'eyes' mirrored back to me from some distance in the light of my torch, but they were a long way off. It was only a glimmer, and I was uncertain whether in fact I had seen a reflection. It could have been a light from a building in the background momentarily causing a glimmer through the leaves and bushes. Or could it have been Jessie? Or worse still, a leopard. I called her name, but there was no response. We went on, crouching low through the undergrowth, and Induna still with me on a leash kept going the wrong way around bushes

with thorns. When I was able to stand up again, I shone about in the direction I thought Jessie might be. This time I saw the unmistakable reflection of two eyes, set wide apart. They stared at me, as a cat might from cover. After an initial hesitation to analyze the reflection, I decided that they were not the eyes of a leopard, and as Jessie is a particularly large Ridgeback, the distance between the eyes were more likely to be hers than those of a leopard. Jessie made no sound, and Induna became very nervous. As I went forward cautiously but with haste, I had to drag Induna along. When 10 m from the 'eyes' I did a final check to ensure that the 'eyes' were still there, and had not become those of a leopard. They remained those of Jessica. I saw her clearly now, and she was straining against the wire snare to come to me. Concerned for her I hurried forward, dragging the very worried pup with me. Jessie was fine. She had no injuries, no leopard had got to her. The snare had thankfully not cut into her, nor had the ends of the twisted wire injured her. She was delighted when I freed her, and jumped right on top of me while untying the snare at the vase of a root to which it was anchored. My helpers were amazed that she was alright, as they said they had seen leopard in the area only the night before. On the way down, we return to the staff accommodation to drop off my helpers, and then I went back to the waiting vehicle on the lakeshore. Jessie was already in the back when I arrived with Induna. She had had enough for one day and was pleased to be back in 'civilization'.

#### **Subscript:**

Despite the late rains of 1998 in Zimbabwe generally, elephants have been feeding on domestic trees in the Kariba township throughout the wet season. Buffalo always roam about in small groups, keeping to the more dense patches of riverine vegetation in gullies during the day, and moving about at night. Leopards abound, and weekly there are reports of domestic dogs and cats having been taken by them at night. Other wildlife, such as hippo, bushbuck, klipspringer, duiker, waterbuck and a few Zebra, though not often seen, move about freely feeding in the numerous unfrequented places. Poaching is a major problem for this unique environment, where man and wildlife coexist with relatively few and infrequent problems.



**Kariba**, **Zimbabwe** The little town which developed haphazardly on the hills near the site of the massive hydroelectric dam constructed across the Zambezi River in the 1950s, became known as "Kariba". Kariba is now a small and spread-out resort town which is the starting point for tourism activities centered on the lake of the same name.
