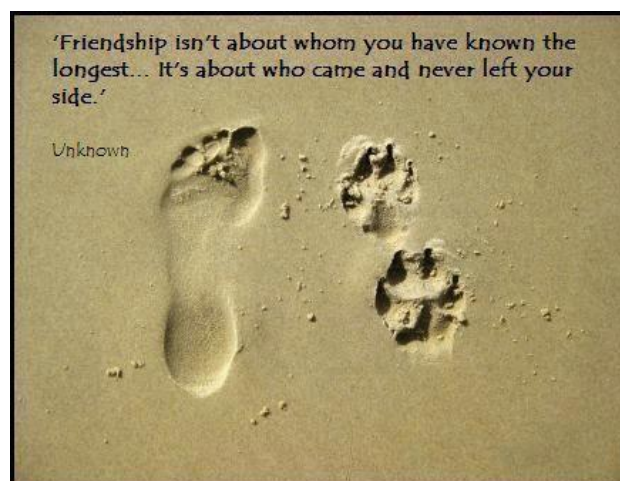
*RIP sweet Riggs – a life cut way too short*

I have another black bear and ridgeback story to relate from our beautiful Ottawa Valley. Some of you may remember that last fall, the Ridgeback roster published a little story about my female, Anoona, discretely warning me of a big, male bear behind the hunt camp. I was oblivious to his presence and Anoona tried her best to get me out of there without disrupting the bear, who was feeding on apples.

Well, we had another bear encounter and it was a totally different reaction from the ridgebacks, perhaps because it's two dogs together now.

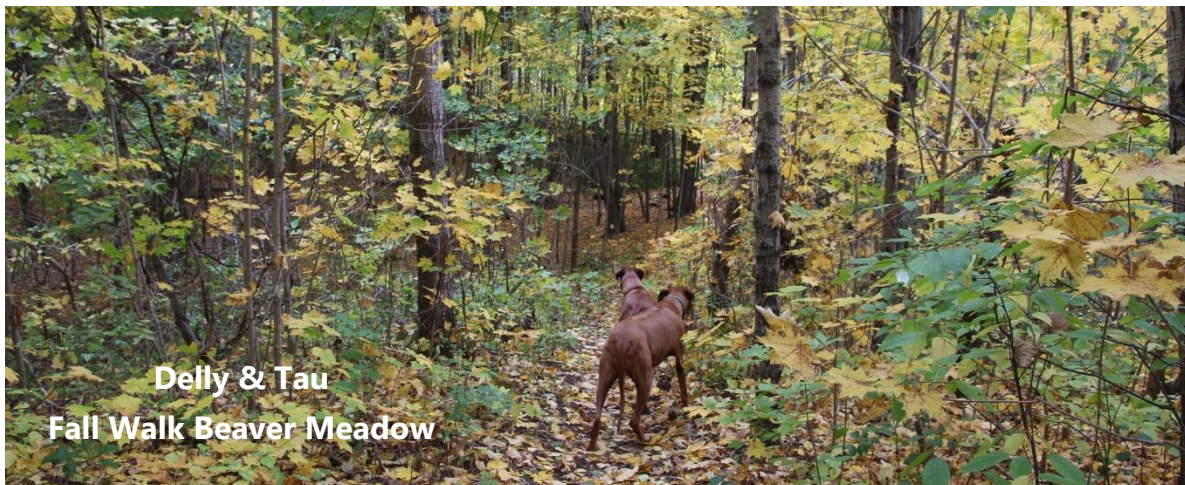

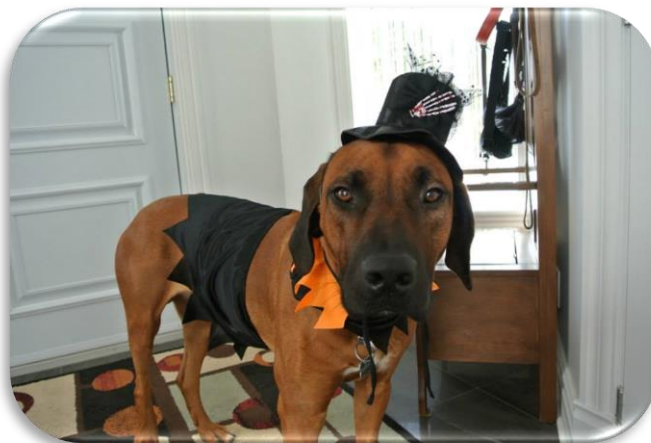
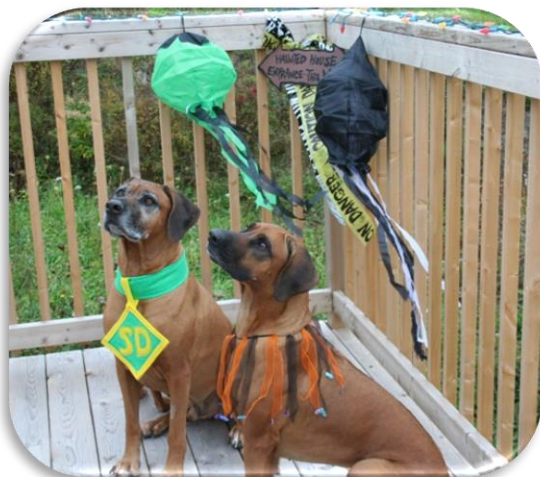
## PUMPKIN DOG TREATS

2 ½ cups whole wheat flour  
2 eggs  
½ cup pureed pumpkin  
2 Tbsp peanut butter  
½ tsp salt  
½ tsp ground cinnamon

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
2. Whisk together the flour, eggs, pumpkin, peanut butter, salt and cinnamon in a bowl.
3. Add water as needed to help make the dough workable, but the dough should be dry and stiff.
4. Roll the dough until it is ½ inch thick. Cut into ½ inch pieces.
5. Bake in a preheated oven until hard, about 40 minutes. Store in airtight container.

## HOW TO WALK A HUMAN

### The Ridgeback Guide
