


Health Matters

The biggest health problem in modern day dogs is widely agreed to be obesity. Wild dogs and working dogs may eat to meet their caloric needs and not over eat. The average pet however eats to relieve boredom and the owner often encourages this by providing excessive treats as a way of showing love.

How do you tell if your dog is overweight? Looking at your dog from above, if you notice that the pup looks rather rotund and oval-shaped, it's likely that your dog is fat. If, on the other hand, you notice that your dog has a defined waist toward the rear and a straight build down the sides, then they're probably at a healthy weight. Your Rhodesian Ridgebacks abdomen should not be the same level as the chest and should be tucked up when looking at from the side. You should also be able to easily feel your dogs ribs, if you have to press your fingers in to feel ribs your dog is likely obese.

If you free-choice feed your dog throughout the day, this can encourage obesity.

Obesity may cause and definitely exacerbates many health issues such as:

- Diabetes.
- Skin problems.
- Heart problems.
- Joint problems.
- Kidney disease.
- Canine arthritis.
- Certain cancers.
- Liver problems.Mobility issues.
- Breathing problems.

Pets with obesity are at increased risk of metabolic and endocrine disorders, especially type 2 diabetes, respiratory disorders and renal dysfunction. In my opinion, the most significant consequence of pet obesity is diminished quality of life and reduced life expectancy. Science is pointing toward chronic, low-grade inflammation as the chief common denominator of these obesity-related disorders.

Before starting a weight loss journey with your dog consult your veterinarian. A mild weight loss objective may be achievable with a simple reduction in food provided. But if a dog is grossly obese a change in food may be necessary. If you simply reduce the food given below the recommendations on the bag you may not be able to meet the dog's nutritional requirements. That's when diet pet foods or a senior diet may be what your dog needs. Daily exercise is

important to maintain a healthy weight and support a quality of life. All dogs enjoy a walk that I call a "scratch and sniff". This is a form of enrichment and even older dogs who may have some health issues may enjoy a slow walk. Younger dogs need activities to burn off energy and may enjoy an off leash walk in a safe area.

Maintenance of a healthy weight for your dog is one of the best things you can do to ensure a long healthy life.

Hemp Oil

I started using hemp seed oil when I noticed alopecia in my one ridgeback. Now I use it regularly in all my dogs diet and this is why.

Hemp seed oil and hemp oil are 2 different oils.

The hemp oil is known as cbd and the hemp seed oil is made from the seed only.

I use hempseed oil regularly in my ridgebacks and my basenji's diet.

Benefits:

- ❖ Anti inflammatory and moisturizing properties. Reduces joint pain, promotes skin and coat health, soothes inflammation, may prevent cancer.
- * Ratio of 3:1 omega 6 to omega 3 fatty acids Produces fatty acids that your dog cannot get through regular diet.

Warnings:

❖ if you cook your dog's meals do not add the Hemp seed oil until after you finish cooking. Hemp seed oil can cause an imbalance if fed with chicken.

Dosage:

❖ 1 tsp per 1 1/4 lb of food

You can also use directly on dogs skin where you see irritations, dry skin, red flaky skin.

Avoid if you notice vomiting, diarrhea, or any other reactions and always consult a vet or homeopathic vet if you feel unsure about administering.

My go to is big country Raw's hemp oil and they have a great breeder's program.




