Information – Regional Specialty – Saturday, August 24


SD&G Show, Maxville Ontario.

RHODESIAN RIDGEBACKS SIGHTHOUNDS OR SCENT HOUNDS???

I have been asked to write an article on why Ridgebacks are not sighthounds. Personally, I have always viewed them as a Dual-Purpose hound, using scent first, then sight, and equally their hearing when they are not able to locate a scent. Living with this breed for over 30 years and watching them as a pack I have also experienced that subtle body language they use with each other for each individual's role when trying to catch a prey.

Here is a description of sighthounds and scent hounds according to the encyclopedia.

Sighthounds (also called gazehounds) are a type of hound that hunts primarily by sight and speed.
Whereas a scent hound relies on scent and *endurance*.

Sighthounds rely on their eyesight to spot motion from a considerable distance and their impressive speed to chase their prey. They are typically very athletic and lean, small heads, deep chests and narrow waists.

Sighthounds are dolichocephalic. Meaning the width of the head is less than ³/₄ of the length. A longer muzzle means they're that much closer to prey, they also have longer nasal passages and can intake more air. As well as they are more aerodynamic with that shape of head.

Scent hounds rely on their sense of smell and *endurance* to hunt down and track their prey. Stamina is key to their physical attributes instead of the speed of the sighthounds. Scent hounds were also bred to hunt in packs.

The CKC (CANADIAN KENNEL CLUB) defines the general appearance of a Ridgeback as.

• The Ridgeback should represent a strong muscular and active dog, symmetrical in outline, and capable of *great endurance* with a *fair* amount of speed.

Below is the FCI (FEDERATION CYNOLOGIQUE INTERNATIONALE) description of the general appearance.

• The Rhodesian Ridgeback should represent a well balanced, strong, muscular, agile and active dog, symmetrical in outline, and capable of *great endurance* with a *fair* amount of speed. The emphasis is on agility, elegance and soundness with no tendency towards massiveness.

The takeaway from the Ridgeback descriptions is great endurance. A sighthound that is known and built for great speed will not have the endurance to track a prey over a long distance as they have short bursts of speed. Ridgebacks are amazing dogs, but they are not sighthounds, just simply due to their conformation and hunting style differences.

Now, do Ridgebacks like to lure course? Yes, some do when they have a good prey drive. But some don't. The same can be true for other breeds and mixes. I have had a couple earn a JC (junior courser, AKC), and FCH (field championship, CKC and AKC). I have also had dogs that won't lure course, and just run back to the car. I have witnessed when a few Ridgebacks course at the same time, that they start to hunt the lure with one going one way while the other goes after the lure, so the one dog anticipates where the lure is going and tries to ambush it. An unfortunate run for lure coursing, but an interesting view of how they hunt in a pack. I encourage anyone interested in lure coursing with their Ridgeback to give it a try. It can be a great way to spend the day with your dog(s)!

Upcoming CDC Dog Importation Rule

Now Includes Options for Frequent Travellers to U.S.

We continue to advocate on behalf of our members, to support those who legitimately import and travel with their dogs to the United States, and who will be impacted by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) new dog importation rule, **effective August 1, 2024**.

Most recently, CKC met with the Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA), including the Canadian Veterinary Medical Association (CVMA) and Pets Canada, to discuss the impact of the new CDC rule on CKC members and other groups. We learned that since CDC consultations occurred in 2023, CFIA has been working with U.S. regulators to share the impact of the rule on Canadians. Due to the relationship CKC built with CFIA over the past 2-3 years, CFIA shared specific concerns on CKC's behalf to the CDC and the impact it would have, highlighting the importance of allowing some movement of dogs less than 6 months of age for legitimate reasons.

Since the CDC announced the new rule, CFIA acknowledged that there has been little time to develop new processes and communicate the changes to the affected parties. The Agency shared that they recognize the resource burden the new certification process will place on the veterinary community, including CFIA veterinarians, and is working with CDC to explore solutions to simply the certification process.

CFIA also shared that they have consulted with CDC and the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) to address these concerns. Further, they shared that the following changes have been made to reduce the burden on CKC members who frequently travel with their dog(s) to the U.S. for shows, events or veterinary/emergency appointments.

The Certification of Dog Arriving from Dog-Maintained Rabies Variant Virus (DMVV)-free or Low-Risk Country into the United States form has different entry requirements depending on whether and where the dog was vaccinated.

This includes:

A single entry into the U.S. for 30 days (after being issued) if it does not contain information about rabies vaccination administered in a dog rabies-free or low-risk country. (Note: CDC states in the Travel Checklist for dogs that have been ONLY in countries that are dog rabies-free or low-risk in the 6 months before entry that rabies vaccination is not required if the dog has been only in dog rabies-free or low-risk countries for 6 months, but is strongly recommended. It may also be required by the U.S. state or territory to which the dog is traveling).

OR

Multiple entries into the U.S. for the duration the rabies vaccination is valid (1 or 3 years) if the rabies vaccination was administered in a dog rabies-free or low-risk country (Note: Canada is considered a DMRVV-free and a low-risk country)

This means that frequent travellers will not have to complete the Certification of Dog Arriving from Dog-Maintained Rabies Variant Virus (DMVV)-free or Low-Risk Country into the United States form again until the rabies vaccination expires.

You may complete the CDC dog import form 2 to 10 days in advance, and you can also submit the form online while in line at the border crossing, if you have internet access.

We are encouraged by the recent changes made by CDC that will benefit CKC members who travel frequently to the U.S. We also remain committed to working with CFIA, the American Kennel Club (AKC) and other stakeholders, to try and obtain special consideration for CKC members who remain unduly impacted by the new rule. We are optimistic about further changes and will provide an update following our next meeting with CFIA mid-June. Additionally, we are still exploring taking some steps with our partners at the AKC.




